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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The mission of the institution is to impart higher education by nurturing intellectual and scientific temperament in keeping with Indian ethos and values for the development. Established in 1959, by the people of Kokrajhar town, realizing the dire necessity of establishing a college for the educationally backward region to impart higher education to young learners who are unable to go distant places for want of adequate means, the Kokrajhar Govt. College (erstwhile Kokrajhar College) has served the people of the region at its best capacity to fulfill the dream of thousands of its founders.

At the time of establishment, the number of persons having higher educational qualifications could be enumerated at one's fingertips. Recognising the role played by the college, the Govt. of Assam gave it recognition by upgrading it to a full-fledged Government College on 22nd August 2006 and has since been rechristened as Kokrajhar Govt. College.

Therefore, it makes sincere efforts to transform students, faculty members, staff and people who come into our contact, towards socially responsible citizens. The institution makes genuine efforts to fulfil its Social Responsibility and therefore provides the people an opportunity for higher education so that they could shoulder the responsibility of educating their people on large scale.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Kokrajhar Govt. College, established in the year 1959, is presently affiliated to Bodoland University (BU) situated at Kokrajhar. Now, the college is offering 29 programmes out of which 22 are UG programmes and 7 are PG programmes. It follows all courses as per the curriculum designed by the University.

The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process. The **Academic Council** of the college regulates, monitors and ensures literal implementation of the **Academic Calendar** published at the beginning of every academic session. It contains schedule of all academic and non-academic activities such as **Sessional Examinations**, departmental class tests, practical works, assignments, college week, workdays, holidays etc. This information can be availed more conveniently from the college website as well as **KGC App**. A **central class routine** is prepared by **Routine Committee** for smooth running of classes. **Log book** for recording the activities of faculty members, **students attendance registers**, **assignment submission register**, **marks of internal evaluation** are properly maintained in all the 19 departments of the institution.

In order to ensure a more **student-centric** learning approach, different teaching methods like **experiential learning, research works, field trips, hands on training, use of ICT tools** have been used considerably. For skill enhancement **12 add on courses** and **35 certificate courses** have been offered by various departments of the college in 2021-22 session. Total **1681** no. of students have enrolled themselves for certificate courses.

Cross-cutting issues regarding gender, professional ethics, human values, environment and sustainability are ensured to be integrated in the prescribed courses. Seminar, events, programmes, discussions are periodically organised based on these crosscutting issues by institutional cell/club like **Eco Club**, **Women Cell** etc. **Gender Audit and Green Audit reports** are prepared yearly to check and work on the needed aspects.

Students' feedback on curriculum and Students' Satisfaction Survey on teaching-learning process is annually collected, analysed and discussed for necessary actions.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Kokrajhar Govt. College abides by the guidelines prescribed by Govt. of India for enrolment of Students against the various reserved categories like **ST/SC/OBS/Divyangs** and they are admitted purely on the basis of merit. Students are monitored through continuous and comprehensive patterns of Experiential Learning platforms like **Career Exposure Visits, Field Study, Educational Excursion, Outreach Programmes and Workshops**. Participative Learning is also encouraged by the Departments for holistic growth of students. They are engaged in various Participatory activities like **Community Surveys, Project Reports, Group Discussion, Progress Report, Departmental Seminar, Quiz Competitions, and Interactive Sessions with Experts** in various fields.

The students are also made to undergo several **Problem-Solving Methodologies namely Practical Works**, **Intelligent Test, Brainstorming Sessions, Self-Assessment and Group Learning** in order to augment the learning experience. The teachers use ICT enabled Teaching-Learning Aids to increase the attention span of students and also to make them familiar with modern day smart classroom tools like Power Point (PPT), E-books, Ejournal, WhatsApp, PPT Slides, Multimedia classes, Audio Visual Teaching Aids, Matlab, Youtube Channel.

The Central Library of the college is enabled with Networked Internet Connections which is used by U.G. and P.G. students. The Faculty Members are motivated are motivated to **use Digital tools and online portals like SWAYAM, N-LIST and National Digital Library** for imparting effective knowledge. A good number of Faculty Members in the Departments have **Ph. D Degree, in addition to NET/SLET.**

The process of evaluation is very stringent with internal assessment being done centrally and also by the Departmental levels by conducting **Sessional Tests and Home Assignments**. The grievances of the students, is addressed through a very strong mechanism of Feedback collection, which is done by the college authorities. The Departments also play an active role in addressing the emotional needs of the students by giving **Special Classes** to the students experiencing turmoil.

Kokrajhar Govt. College has a strong mechanism for adhering to the best practices in the domain of **Teaching**, **Learning and Evaluation**.

Research, Innovations and Extension

During the last five years, the college has been putting continuous effort to create a congenial atmosphere for **Research and Development**. The college has an active research and publication cell to promote and monitor the quality of research. The college has been encouraging faculty members to do dynamic research work in their fields by granting on-duty leave and a travelling allowance. Over the last five years, more than **80** research papers have been published in various highly reputed SCOPUS and SCI-indexed journals along with UGC CARES listed journals.

The **Department of Botany** has been assigned as the nodal department to establish a **Botanical Garden and a Fern House** to preserve various indigenous medicinal plants and fern species. The department has also been

working to discover wild mushrooms' medicinal and nutritional values. The department has conducted a training programme on mushroom cultivation in this connection. The college has sanctioned an amount of Rs. 70,000/- to the department to do an in-house research project on aromatic medicinal plants of Chakrashila Wildlife Sanctuary.

Five faculty members from the departments of **Mathematics and Chemistry** have been assigned as **PhD** guides by Bodoland University to promote research activities under.

The Department of Chemistry has been taking an active role in groundwater quality management. During the Covid 19 pandemic period, the department prepared **hand sanitisers** and made them commercially available in the market. Training sessions were also conducted to train NGOs.

The **Department of Physics** has taken a very active role to ignite the minds of young and talented school students in creating a scientific temperament.

The Language Departments, viz., Bodo and Assamese, have been publishing Annual Magazines to publish their research articles.

The **Departments of Mathematics and Chemistry** jointly organized an online workshop on research methodology covering MS word. 18 **MoUs** were signed to exchange knowledge among the students and teachers.

The college has been conducting **workshops and certificate courses** to promote entrepreneurship. Awareness programmes have been conducted to spread awareness about social evils such as witch haunting, alcoholism etc.

The college is going to establish an incubation centre for research and its development.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Kokrajhar Govt. College gives top priority to fulfil the requisite norms provided by the affiliating university in terms of **infrastructure**, teaching-learning facilities, ICT tools etc. Every department has been provided with sufficient classrooms, laboratories, stock books, record-keeping books, attendance registers, and all other relevant materials required for teaching-learning. Most of the departments are provided with ICT facilities like digital board laptops, projector, etc. The Science departments are well established and equipped with laboratories which cater to the requirements of undergraduate as well as the postgraduate curriculum of the affiliating universities. Apart from the central library, all the departments have their own seminar library for their students and teachers. The college campus is fully equipped with Wi-Fi facilities for faculties, students, and office bearers. The campus has facilities like Computer Centre, Students' Day Home, a purified drinking water facility, a Canteen etc. which are used optimally by stakeholders. The college has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), yoga centre etc. The college upgrades its IT facilities frequently as per the needs and requirements. These include an increase in the number of computers, internet connectivity, a new institutional portal, the appointment of a System Administrator, portal updating, setting up of ICT-enabled classrooms and seminar halls, online admission, library digitization etc. The number of computers has been gradually increasing in the last five years, with the setting up of additional computer labs for the Physics Department, Wi-fi and LAN arrangements have been done, Internet connection bandwidth has been upgraded to 300 MBPS/ GBPS. A new dynamic institutional portal

(www.kgc.edu.in) has been designed to meet the rising demands in the educational and administrative domains, whereby large database needs to be stored and displayed in the website in the interest of different stakeholders. The new institutional web portal has been designed within the college through **its in-house technical expertise by the System Administrator**. The central library of the college has been fully digitized through the use of **RFID technology. Solar lamps** are also installed at strategic points.

Student Support and Progression

The students of Kokrajhar Govt. College receive scholarships every year such as **Ishan Uday Scholarship** (UGC), ST, SC, OBC, Post-Matric Scholarship for Minorities Cs etc. The college has instituted PNB award from the session 2018-19 for outstanding performance in the academics.

Kokrajhar Govt. College has been undertaking **capacity building and skill enhancement activities**. The college has organized **mock test for engineering/medical entrance examination, workshop on personality development and mind power, self-defence programme for female students, orientation on career options and opportunities, interactive lecture series, various certificate courses, lecture series on women health and hygiene** etc. to enhance the physical and mental well-being of the students. 'Resume Writing Workshop', 'How to face Interview', 'Defence Service as a career' etc. are also organized for the betterment of the students.

The progression rate of students to higher education and their placement in various positions is also noteworthy. Students are employed in reputed **multi-national companies such as Blackstraw**, AI **Technologies**, Adda 24x7, Tebixa etc and in Govt. services. The success rate of students in GATE, GRE, CAT, GMAT, JAM, TOEFL etc. are significantly rising.

Kokrajhar Govt. College Alumni Association is a registered wing bearing registration number RS/KJR/253/U/12 of 2020-21. It has been contributing to the development of the institution through financial and/or other support services.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance of the college reflects its mission and vision. It corroborates a decentralised participatory nature of governance where respective **stakeholders actively participates** in the process of decision making. The college authority prepares **a perspective plan** to maintain its vision and mission of the college and accordingly several activities have been successfully implemented.

The college has a clear and effective **functional set-up** for its administration and quality management. Different committees of the college are functioning according to the **policies and procedures** of the administrative mechanism of the college.

The college stimulates e-governance in admission, finance, students support services, library services feedback collection.

The college provides all welfare measures to the teaching and non-teaching staff as per the provision of the government of Assam namely **pension**, **GPF**, **Gratuity**, **GIS**, **leave facility**, **medical facility** etc. A **thrift society** is also functioning under the society registration act for the teaching and non-teaching staff to fulfil the

immediate cash demand of the staff.

Annual performance index of teaching staff is considered at the time of promotion of teachers to their higher stages.

The college conducts **internal and external financial audits** regularly.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell organises regular meeting for **quality teaching and learning** environment.

The college has regularly participated in NIRF, AISHE surveys. The college authority initiated International Organisation for Standardisation (ISO) certification and Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) certification from this year.

Electric lights are energy saving: LED lights and power-efficient equipment installed.

All solid wastes are managed by SLRM of Kokrajhar Municipal Board. e-Waste is manged through SLRM as well as external vendors.

Rain-water harvesting with a storage capacity of 1000 Litres is effectively maintained for Water conservation. A pond is created near the college botanical garden to store natural water and create an artificial ecosystem

The college will adhere to the 4 year curriculum framework with multiple entries and exits as provided by the University. The college already has a well established framework for offering elective courses in which student strength varies every year, hence is completely prepared for this concept of multiple entries and exits In accordance with its history of establishment and mission & vision, the teaching learning method adopted in the institution emphasizes blending of academic and social responsibility among its students. The Environmental Studies subject is compulsory for students of all subjects of both streams to make them aware of environment and issues faced by the world we live in. Students are offered a total of 35 multidisciplinary certificate courses along with add-on courses of regular syllabus. Social service activities conducted by NSS, NCC, Clubs and Cells of the sensitized students on educational, social, physical and mental health issues.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	As KGC is a constituent college to Bodoland University and completely adheres to the curriculum framework and syllabi as approved by the University from time to time. The College is going to set up its own MIS system of student data management in next academic year. And hence it is completely prepared to implement Academic Bank of Credits framework as approved by the University.

These courses focus on equipping students with entrepreneurial skill and employability as well as provide value based education and inculcate professional ethics and civil rights. The Environmental Studies course is a part of the ability Enhancements courses. The institution provides opportunities for experiential learning and skill development through fieldworks, industrial visits, projects works and hands-on learning methods. In addition extension services and community development programmes are carried out to fulfill its mission to integrate in the students the ennobling virtues of Indian ethos and values, tolerance and co- operation and a sense of appreciation of traditional and cultural inheritance of the nation and create unity and integrity among the people.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The college has established a robust and credible continuous evaluation and internal assessment system to constantly monitor the progress of all its students including their regularity. Based on these assessments the faculty plan their intervention to help the weak students and slow learners so that they can also cope with the rigor of the curriculum. Kokrajhar Govt. College ensures student-centric model in both academic and co-curricular activities. IQAC of the college has always ensured to make teachers aware of Outcome based Education (OBE). All the faculties of the college are well-informed about OBE. Teachers of the college get ample opportunity to design the syllabus of its affiliating university. All courses of the affiliating university are under OBE standard with Program Outcomes (PO), Program Specific Outcomes (PSO) and Course Outcomes (CO) specified and these are displayed on the institutional website. The Student Induction Programme, an orientation on the concept of outcome-based education and programme outcomes are done for the students. The teachers in every department informs the course outcomes of each course on the commencement of the first class to the students. The College has devised different methodologies for assessing the attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes. Distance education/online education:	The college has subscribed to Cisco Webex meeting and Google Suite free version which includes all Google tools like Google Meet, Jamboard, Google Classroom, Google Calendar to develop and deliver the entire teaching learning process in an online environment in addition to offline teaching and interaction. During the Covid-19 lockdown period teachers used these platforms to conduct of online classes, management of attendance, submission of assignments, webinars, training programs, etc. Teachers also launched their own YouTube channels along with official channels of the college to deliver e- content, videos and to publish webinar and videos of college programmes. Presently, Environmental Studies, a foundation course for undergraduate students is taught online using Cisco Webex. Department of Computer Science offered certificate course in computer application in blended mode where theoretical classes were held online whereas practical were conducted in offline mode. The college has registered in SWAYAM portal and students are enrolled in appropriate courses present there. The institution also host a study centre of IGNOU, which is a university of distance learning.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The Academic Council of the college regulates, monitors and ensures literal implementation of the academic schedules published at the beginning of every academic session under the supervision of Principal, Kokrajhar Govt. College. The Council directs its departments to conduct departmental seminars, sessional examinations, field studies and excursions along with the routine programme. The verification of syllabi of subjects is done by the affiliating university.

- At the beginning of a year a College Academic Calendar is prepared with adherence to the University academic calendar by the Calendar Committee assigned by IQAC, KGC. The Academic Calendar contains time period of all academic and non-academic activities. The institution has also its own KGC App providing details about routine, syllabus, calendar, holiday list, work days.
- The Academic Council, through daily time table ensures spaces for the remedial classes/tutorials in the weekly routine to facilitate slow learners along with regular class management.
- In order to provide study materials, lectures in a more convenient way, e-resources, software, elearning tools like Cisco WebX, G-suit, Google classroom, YouTube channels are used by the teachers. Besides, twelve smart boards are also used in the college.
- The Council adheres to strict implementation of the academic schedules like sessional examinations, departmental class tests, practicals, assignments, field visits on regular basis as a part of formative evaluation of curriculum programme. The College adheres to the educational framework that emphasises on student-centric strategies for boosting learning.
- Syllabus completion review is taken year-wise. It is incorporated in students feedback analysis.
- The college places a huge emphasis on experiential learning. Some of the programmes require students to study through field trips, industrial visits, working on research projects for their dissertations, collaborating closely with the community, and working in their departmental labs for onsite experience. Along with this, hands on training, skill enhancement programmes like mushroom cultivation, fern house, vermi compost etc. are also included in the curriculum. All of these learning opportunities at Kokrajhar Govt. College aid students in becoming well-rounded graduates and make learning activities more student-centered.
- Importance is given on knowledge sharing through students exchange and faculty exchange programmes arranged by various departments.
- The institution has a well maintained and well equipped central library named Nilkamal Brahma Central Library, KGC for dissemination of knowledge.
- Faculty members of the college remain engaged in upgrading themselves through various selfdevelopment scholarly activities.

The College organizes Social Outreach Programme on these issues through a range of activities/ programmes/ lectures showcasing gender and environmental issues to sensitize people.
- Environmental education is a mandatory for the undergraduate students, which introduces to crucial environmental concerns. The field investigation and report writing on environment related issues is mandatory.
- The institution carries out a plantation programme on "World Environment Day" every year.
- The Eco Club works to create and make students aware about an eco-friendly environment. It organizes environmental programmes, quiz and literary competition, popular talks on scientific issues.
- The boys and girls wing of NCC and NSS unit of the College has taken up activities like plantation, awareness programme on gender, health and human rights.

- The institution encourages gender equity within and outside the campus. It motivates all to cultivate gender equality through their speeches and actions. Group discussions and talks on gender issues have been conducted to foster a gender-neutral perspective.

Internal Assessment is done by each department at both **UG** and **PG** levels of the institution as part of the rules set by the affiliating University. Students' progress and performance evaluation is done by teachers frequently in the respective departments.

- Internal assessment marks of students are recorded on the basis of their performance in sessional examinations, their participation in departmental seminars/Group discussions/departmental quiz etc. class attendance, assignment.
- The results of the sessional exams are displayed in the **departmental notice boards.**
- Moreover, the students are allowed to see their **corrected examination scripts**. This is done to make the **students aware of their mistakes** and to highlight the areas where scope lies to score better marks.

The teacher also **appreciates best performances** of students for boosting their morale. Such evaluation process makes the students more refined and confident for the end semester (final) examinations conducted by the university.

The institution has a **regular and continuous culture of conducting examinations** in departmental level and centrally. It is mandatory for all the students to appear in the examinations and the whole **process of evaluation is very transparent and organized.**

- Utmost care is taken by each department of the institution in terms of addressing examination related grievances so that they are redressed on a **time-bound basis**.
- Students having **grievances regarding marks** obtained under different category of questions or issues relating to **wrong calculation, omission of marks** in internal examinations conducted by the college are reported to the respective head of the departments who take immediate recourse to the problem.
- Students have the freedom to approach the **Principal** directly with regard to any of their grievances.
- On the other hand, grievances related to Examinations conducted by **University** are mainly addressed by the **administrative staff.** If any student comes with any grievance, he or she is generally guided by the college office to apply in a proper online or offline system.

Ecosystem for Research & Innovations:

Kokrajhar Govt. College promotes research by providing resources to researchers to enhance their research capabilities and also by recognizing research output of faculty members and research students. The college constituted a Research and Development Cell (RDC) to develop and strengthen the research ecosystem in the college comprising a Research and Development Advisory Council with the Principal as the Chairman. Under this council, some subcommittees were formed, viz, Finance and Infrastructure Committee to look into the financial side, Research Programmes and Policy Development Committee to make policy for research-oriented programmes, the Collaboration and Community Committee for collaborative works and a Product Development and Monitoring Committee.

The objectives of the college Research Promotion Policy may be specified as follows:

- To Generate and Provide Resources for research
- To Enhance Research Capabilities, Collaborations and Output
- To ensure Ethical research practices in college

The following activities have been done by college:

- Both faculty and scholars are provided the services of the research laboratories available in the college.
- Partial cost of attending FDPs/seminars/conferences by the faculty members for quality enhancement of faculty is provided on case-by-case basis.
- Introduced In-House Research Scheme by providing research fund to faculties interested in research in line with MRP scheme of UGC.
- Enhanced Research capabilities through Collaborations

Indian Knowledge System:

The college has constituted an IKS (Indian Knowledge System) cell to facilitate and coordinate interdisciplinary works, create mechanisms for research and to promote popularization schemes. The college has incorporated IKS by conducting Certificate Courses in this connection as following:

Certificate Course in:

- Traditional Bodo Medicine preserves and promotes rich medical practice of ethnic Bodo community.
- Yoga teaches healthy lifestyle and exposes students to our rich tradition of this art.
- Material Culture of Bodos trains learners to make indigenous equipment/tools of Bodos.
- Horticulture educates students about local flora and fauna and its preservation and commercialization
- Sericulture trains silk production which is a rich tradition of Assam

Awareness about IPR & establishment of an IPR cell:

An IPR cell has been constituted for IPR-related works. A seminar on IPR was conducted on 23rd April 2022 to create public awareness about the benefits of Intellectual property, and enhance and strengthen IP administration. Mr. P.K. Bagchi, IP Attorney, Bureau of Patent & Trademark was invited as the resource person for the programme.

Incubation Centre:

The college has constituted an incubation centre in the department of Botany. This centre has already set up a mushroom cultivation centre and made it open for commercialization. The incubation centre aims to undertake research work on varieties of edible and nonedible mushrooms found in the local area and to train students on Mushroom cultivation. Recently Horticulture unit has been added to the centre and people engaged there have started developing their product and commercialisation.

Department of Chemistry based on its experience have introduced a centre for candle and soap making. The certificate course offered in the department trains people to experiment on the production of these products.

Kokrajhar Govt. College gives top priority to the fields that lead to fulfilling the requisite norms provided by the affiliating university in terms of infrastructure, teaching–learning facilities, ICT tools, etc. Every department is equipped has been provided with sufficient classrooms, laboratories, stock books, recordkeeping books, attendance registers, and all other relevant materials required for teaching-learning. Most of the departments are provided with ICT facilities like laptops, projectors, digital boards, etc. The science departments are well established and fabricated with well-equipped laboratories which cater to the need of undergraduate as well as the postgraduate curriculum of the affiliating universities. Apart from the central library, all the departments have their own departmental library for their students and teachers. The college campus is fully equipped with Wi-Fi facilities for faculties, students, and office bearers. The campus has facilities like computer centre, students' day home, a purified drinking water facility, a canteen, etc. which are used optimally by stakeholders. The existing facilities of the college are -

- Well-furnished 70 Classrooms out of which 32 are ICT-enabled.
- A well-furnished cabin of the principal.
- A well-furnished cabin for the Vice-principal along with an attached examination control room.
- A well-furnished office comprising 4 big rooms and one SA chamber
- 27 Well-equipped laboratories of 7 science departments and 2 Arts department.
- 3 nos. of ICT-enabled seminar/conference halls.
- One ICT-enabled well-furnished auditorium
- Sanitary system with requisite facilities.
- One Girls' Hostel and two Boys' Hostels along with the superintendent's quarters.
- Library with modern facilities like RFID and SOUL 2.0.
- The library has access to E-Resources through N-LIST, DELNET, and NDL.

- Well-equipped college canteen.
- Installation of 42 nos. of CCTV cameras on the campus to ensure safety and security.
- Ramps in all blocks, Divyangjan-friendly washroom, and reading room.
- 03 Generators of 25, 15, and 5 KVA power respectively to ensure uninterrupted power supply.
- Solar lamps with photovoltaic cells are installed in the campus which saves the electrical energy of the college.

For all-round development of the students in the field of sports and culture, the college provides facilities.

- There is an open-air space for open-air programmes.
- There are outdoor facilities for Football, Athletics, and other track and field events, separate volleyball courts, as well as a facility for badminton which is shared by Kokrajhar District Sports Association as per a Deed of Agreement.
- Students' Day Home accommodates facilities for table tennis, carom and chess.
- Training on Yoga is provided by experts of Patanjali Yoga Samiti, Kokrajhar as per MoU.

Kokrajhar is a place of indigenous communities rich in the field of literature, music, dance and fine arts.

4.2.1 Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The Kokrajhar Govt. College Library(Nilkamal Brahma Central Library) was established in 1959. It is the knowledge resource centre of the college. The College library has a collection of about 34741 copies of text and reference books covering a wide range of subjects. Besides these, some useful Journals, Magazines and Newspapers are subscribed regularly to serve the multifarious needs of the student community. Apart from it, every department of the college is also provided with books on varied topics including textbooks and reference books for departmental use which can be loaned out to the students as well as issued to the faculty members for their use.

The LMS has components namely, shelf management, library stock verification, library membership, membership login, issue books, return books, etc. This software also provides the facility to create, view and print records of accession registers, subscription lists, transaction reports, membership reports, etc. The OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) facility is available in the ILMS for the status of a book such as available/issue, shelf number, accession number, And the bibliographic information of the book. This facility helps the reader to track the books easily. Records of books are generated Subject-wise, accession number-wise, author-wise, publisher-wise as well as ISBN-wise. Bar codes are generated by using RFID (Radio Frequency Identification).

- The library has an e-Resources repository of CDs and DVDs available for library users. Accesses to online resources such as N-LIST, DELNET, etc. are also available in the library.
- Books, theses and journals by keyword of title, author, ISBN/ISSN No., publisher, subject and accession number, etc. can be searched anywhere in the world through an internet connection and get the information about required collection like the status of books, number of copies and location of the document in the library and other bibliographical details.
- Information like the rules, facilities, instructions, and services of the central library can be obtained from the library webpage (https//www.kgclibrary.in). The webpage also provides the latest updates and displays the remote access facilities of some databases subscribed by the library.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection *Describe IT facilities including Wi-Fi with date and nature of updation, available internet bandwidth within a maximum of 500 words*

Response:

The college upgrades its IT facilities frequently as per the needs and requirements. These include an increase in the number of computers, internet connectivity, a new institutional portal, the appointment of a System Administrator, portal updating, setting up of ICT-enabled classrooms and seminar halls, online admission, library digitization, etc. The number of computers has been gradually increased in the last five years, with the setting up of additional computer labs for the Physics Department, Wi-fi and LAN arrangements have been made. Internet connection bandwidth has been upgraded to 300 MBPS. A new dynamic institutional portal (www.kgc.edu.in) has been designed to meet the rising demands in the educational and administrative domains, whereby a large database needs to be stored and displayed on the website in the interest of different stakeholders. This new dynamic portal, developed within the college through its in-house technical expertise with unlimited cyberspace, has a good number of features. A System Administrator is being attached to IQAC to monitor the regular updating works in the new portal. The central library of the college has been fully digitized through the use of RFID technology. E-Resource facilities of the library are enhanced through N-LIST, DELNET, NDL (National Digital Library of India), and Open Access.

Kokrajhar Govt. College uses Information and Communication Technology (ICT) tools for effective teaching-learning in the classroom. Functioning of the institutional bodies

6.3.1 The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

Performance appraisal system

The teacher, as a person and teacher as performer, is one of the mandatory assessment for promotion to higher level. The performance of teaching as well as non-teaching members is evaluated at the time of promotion. For teaching faculty members, Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) as per UGC norms is followed. A set of performance appraisal report is filled up by teacher in a given prescribed proforma of Govt. of Assam which is revised by Head of the Department to assess professional aspects of the faculty concerned which is again verified by the coordinator of IQAC and finally recommend by the Principal to the Departmental Promotion Committee (DPC) for assessment. Once DPC assessed and approved, performance appraisal report then send to Government of Assam for promotion of the teachers. Further, the Principal prepare an annual confidential report based on the attitudinal and behavioral aspects of the teacher along with PBAS for promotion.

Effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

As per the Govt. of Assam norms the following facilities are available to all permanent teaching and non-teaching staff.

- Leave to teaching and non-teaching staff are given as per the guidelines of the Govt. of Assam.
- Medical Reimbursement is available as per the guidelines of the Govt. of Assam.
- Pension benefits on retirement to the faculty appointed prior to 2004 are eligible. Faculties joined after 2004 are covered under New Pension Scheme.
- General Provident Fund: All teaching and non-teaching staffs joined before 2004 working against permanent posts are eligible for GPF.

- Gratuity: All teaching and non-teaching staffs working against permanent posts are eligible for gratuity as per Assam govt. norms.
- Leave encashment are availed by retiring faculty as per Assam govt. norms.
- House building loans facility at a subsidized interest rate is available as per govt. norms under 'Apon Ghor Scheme'.
- Loan including house building is also available to the members of the college under Kokrajhar College Sanchay Aru Rindan Samabay Samity Ltd. (a thrift society of the college employees to meet immediate financial requirements)
- Loan including house building is also available to the women members of the college under Pragati Mahlia Sanchay Nidhi (a thrift society of the college women employees to meet immediate financial requirements).
- The college has provision for admissions of eligible wards of employees.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

Kokrajhar Govt. College established IQAC on 19/08/2002. Since its inception, IQAC has dedicated itself to quality assurance and innovations. Prioritizing the need for a student-centric teaching-learning environment and the constant need to evolve according to time, the following two major initiatives have been taken by IQAC:

1. Academic Audit:

IQAC carries out academic audits of each department and various committees including administrative branches every year to enhance and ensure the quality of education. Academic Audit Committee is set up for this purpose. IQAC collects academic plans including publication, extension activity, collaboration, innovative and best practices, assignment, ICT-based activity, students competition, seminars and workshops, etc. IQAC constitutes Academic Audit Committee with members from reputed institutions to evaluate the reports submitted by the departments and committees. The Academic Audit Committee submits its report to the IQAC and the same is put in the General Meeting of the college for discussion and to chalk out remedial measures to enhance the quality of the institution. This exercise has helped all the departments and committees to constantly improve their curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular performances.

2. ICT Enhanced Learning and Management:

In line with the peer team recommendations, there has been a steady increase in the use of ICT for Teaching Learning over the past five years.

IQAC has trained teachers on how to use ICT tools for effective teaching-learning in the classroom. Now, the faculty members extensively use Interactive Boards, LCD projectors including e-resources viz. e-books, e-Journal, ppt., multimedia classes, Matlab, YouTube Channel, Google classroom, etc.

During the Covid19 Pandemic, in order to complete the syllabus, the faculty members were trained to use virtual meeting platforms viz. Cisco Webex, Google Classroom, Google Meet, Zoom App, etc. Faculty members used these platforms for online classes and kept students engaged and updated. IQAC also uses these platforms for meetings, webinars and other administrative purposes.

In addition to these, IQAC takes the following quality initiatives:

- Online feedback on curriculum from students and analysis of feedback and timely action.

7.1.1 Institution has initiated the Gender Audit and measures for the promotion of gender equity during the last five years. *Describe the gender equity & sensitization in curricular and co-curricular activities, facilities for women on campus etc., within 500 words*

Response:

Gender audit has been carried out for last five years by the Gender Audit Committee of the college. The college administration has taken measures for alleviating the margin of gender sensitivity of Kokrajhar Govt. College as recommended in the Gender audit report.

Kokrajhar Govt. College has focused on promoting gender equity in various aspects like Admission, curricular and co-curricular activities, facilities for women on campus and different committees and decision making.

Admission: The enrolment percentage of females is 49% and 48.5% during current and previous two academic years. As per Government of Assam rules, female students of Scheduled Tribe (ST) and Scheduled Caste (SC) categories are exempted from paying tuition fees during admission. This facilitates entry of female students from these categories to enroll in our institute.

Curricular: Faculties give special emphasis to sensitize students on gender issues while teaching those parts of syllabus with Gender issues. In addition, a certificate course in Yoga has been conducted under department of Philosophy to promote physical and mental health of female students.

Co-curricular:

The following co-curricular activities were conducted in last five years to promote gender equity:

1. Celebration of International Women's Day every year on 8th March, along with career counseling/ gender sensitization programs

2. International Seminar on the theme "Changing Status of Women: Myth and Reality with Special Reference to Northeast India"

- 3. Seminar/awareness on women trafficking
- 4. Self-defense programe for female students
- 5. Yoga Training programme

6. NSS, NCC, Student bodies have proportionate participation of women.

Committees: The institution has constituted certain committees as ICC, Anti Ragging Cell, Grievance redressal Cell, Women Cell to prevent any untoward incidence to any girl student and women employee. Mobile numbers of chairperson of these committees are made available on the Notice Board as well as the
College Website. The ICC ensures that posters promoting gender equity & sensitization are placed on the Notice Boards/website. Such awareness posters are also displayed in cultural procession of Annual College Week and departmental magazines. Strict confidentiality is maintained by the all committees to encourage the complainant to lodge complaint without fear.

Security: CCTV cameras are deployed at strategic locations of campus. The surveillance cameras are working 24 x 7 in the campus. During different college events lady teachers/ police constables are specially engaged in these occasions to ensure safety and security of the girl students. The KGCSU is also involved in maintenance of discipline inside the college campus. Female security guards are deployed at Girls' Hostel.

Facilities: The College provides counseling to needy female students through the cells like the Women Cell and Career Counseling Cell under the guidance of experts and teachers. Women Cell takes lead role in conducting programs related to gender issues and overall benefit of female students and employees. The common room facilities for female students are managed in a participative management system by the KGCSU through a significant portfolio "Girls Common Room Secretary". There exists a thrift society named 'Pragati Mahila Sanchay Nidhi' for welfare of female employees in the institute.

Admission: The College since its inception has ruled out exclusive policy. The college caters to admission of General, ST, SC, OBC, EWS categories as per Government rules. Reservation for extra-curricular & special category like Sports, Culture, NCC, NSS, Scouts & Guides, and Persons with different ability, and Fringe village is also incorporated in admission.

Annual Bonjar Festival: The Annual College Week of Kokrajhar Govt. College, also known as Annual Bonjar Festival includes a cultural procession to uphold cultural diversity of the region. Students participate in food Festival in this event which provides an opportunity for the students to project foods of different ethnic communities of the region. Annual Bonjar also provide students a platform to work, participate, compete and succeed in an inclusive environment.

Pre- Bwisagu celebration: Pre- Bwisagu festival is organized with a daylong colourful programme on 12th/13th April every year, to celebrate the season of vibrancy which boosts cultural harmony among the students.

College Magazine: The Annual college magazine, "Bwhwijiri" has been provided with sections on five different languages which reflects linguistic harmony amongst the students.

International Mother language day: This event is organized jointly by the language departments of the college English, Bodo, Assamese, Hindi and Bengali to promote linguistic harmony.
